CHARLES HENRY CHAPMAN (1844-1903) BY ANONYMOUS

Charles Henry Chapman was born in West Drayton on the 8th February 1844 to Robert Chapman (1800-1872) and his wife Elizabeth Terry Abbot (1806-1862). Robert was employed as a police sergeant with the Great Western Railway and it was most probably Robert's posting to Exeter which moved the whole family to the West Country.

Charles married his wife Mary Sarah Davis on 13th December 1873 St Sidwell's parish church in Exeter and she was with him when he died. They had nine children – four girls and five boys. Four of the children predeceased Charles. Their eldest son, Charles Ernest Chapman (1875-1945), followed his father into the postal service, working as a railway telegraphist (in a way, following his grandfather too, by working with the railway company).

The 1871 census shows Charles as a telegraph clerk. I think his appointment was confirmed the following year as there is an entry In the British Postal Service Appointments Book¹ for C H Chapman. He was appointed as a 1st class Clerk. 1881 shows him as working in the civil service telegraph department and in 1891 he had advanced to be a government telegraphist. His illness would have started about 1897 and I presume when it got too bad, he had to retire in 1901 whilst working as a postal clerk.

Charles died on 2nd September 1903 of Bright's disease, which he'd had for six years, and dropsy which he'd had for ten months. It is possible the dropsy developed from the earlier disease. As he had it for six years, this means he had it for four years whilst working with the post office. Unhappily for him, he only had two years of retirement before he died and I imagine they must have been very painful years for him.

I wonder how long it would have been before he sought medical help. There was no national health service then, so any treatment would have to be paid for by the patient, unless he was able to get help at a workhouse Infirmary. The doctor who signed Charles' death certificate was J. S. Steele-Perkins M.R.C.S., a member of a well-respected family of medical practitioners in Exeter whose descendants are still working in the medical profession today.

Bright's Disease

The symptoms were first described in 1827 by an English physician called Richard Bright and these included haemorrhages, apoplexy, convulsions, blindness and coma. Many cases were found to have albumin (a variety of protein)² in the urine with striking morbid changes in the kidney found when an autopsy was performed. Bright's disease is now only used to refer to

historic applications of kidney disease; it would now be called acute or chronic nephritis. The disease was frequently diagnosed in patients with diabetes.

Historically, Bright's disease *could* have been treated with warm baths, blood-letting, squill (a plant, which can be used as a poison or for medicinal purposes)³, digitalis, mercuric compounds, opium, diuretics, laxatives and dietary therapy; this latter included abstinence from alcoholic drinks, cheese and red meat. Then there was the use of electric treatment.

• This form of treatment has been found of wonderful benefit in Brights disease and diabetes by attaching the positive pole to a bifurcated wet sponge electrode to the bare skin over the kidneys. Some apparently hopeless cases have been symptomatically cured, without drugs or diet with this simple treatment.

It sounds a rather terrifying treatment!

Dropsy

Dropsy often develops when kidney disease is evident. The symptoms may include skin which feels tight, with joints that may be hard to move, swollen legs and ankles due to kidney failure. Other symptoms depend on the underlying cause.

The treatment involved resolving the underlying cause of the dropsy. Many cases of kidney disease are treated with diuretics, as this extract from an 1897 medical text shows.⁵

few tonics are endurable, while another seems only to be the worse for every conceivable form of neurotic. The intolerance of opium and mercury by certain persons is well known. It is often found combined in the same person, and especially in the subjects of chronic Bright's disease. In fact such intolerance should always furnish a strong hint to investigate the condition of the kidneys. Chloral hydrate, hydrate, hydrate and other neurotics are well or ill home by

Charles was in good company with his illness. Famous names that also had the disease were the engineers Isambard Kingdom Brunel, who died on 20th September 1859 and Robert Stevenson, who died on 15th October 1859. Robert Stroud, the famed 'birdman of Alcatraz' was diagnosed with this disease shortly after beginning a sentence in Leavenworth Prison.⁶

Charles' father was **Robert Douthwaite Chapman**, born Sutton, Middlesex 1800. He was born to William and Jane Chapman and baptised on 25th May 1800, St Leonard, Heston, Hounslow.

He died in 1872 and was buried on 19th September 1872 at St Mary, Hanwell, Ealing.

Charles' mother was **Elizabeth Terry Abbott**, born in Hanwell, Middlesex to James & Jane Abbott and baptised on 13th August 1806 at St Mary, Hanwell, Ealing.

She died in 1862 and was buried on 19th March 1862 at St Mary, Hanwell, Ealing.

Robert and Elizabeth married on 12th November 1835 at St George, Hanover Square, Westminster. Both signed their names, which would indicate they were literate.

William Douthwaite Chapman (1838-1894). He was born in the Brentford district on 31st January 1838 and died in the Cardiff area. On 20th January 1863 he married Martha Heath (a cook) in Cardiff. William worked as a station master, starting work as a supernumery in 1855 at 15/-. By the time he died, he was a station inspector, earning 30/- (I presume a week). He resigned in December 1893.

Ann Elizabeth Chapman (1840-1881). She was born on 18th June 1839 and baptised on 27 September 1839, West Drayton, Middlesex. She married Alfred Frederick Ewin (a coachman) on 14 May 1860, Westminster, St Marylebone. She died at 6 Brewer Street, Chelsea and was buried in the Brompton Cemetery on 6 July 1861, aged 42 years.

James Robert Chapman (1841). He was born on the 31 October 1841 and baptised on the 5 December 1841 at West Drayton. I cannot accurately trace a marriage or death.

Thomas Abbott Chapman (1849-1928?). He was baptised on 3 June 1849 in West Drayton. I cannot accurately trace a marriage or death

Mary Sarah Davis was born in 1855 in Islington [Q2] to Charles Davis (b.1828 in Clerkenwell) and Harriett Radford (b.1824 in Exeter). Mary died in 1929 aged 74 and I think she was buried in the Higher Cemetery, Exeter on 5th March 1929.

Charles Ernest Chapman was born on 10th January 1875 and baptised 31st May 1875 Exeter, St James. He married Emily Louisa Sidney (1874-1968) in 1899 in Exeter. He worked for the postal service and as a railway telegraphist. He died in 1945.

William Henry Chapman was born on 3rd August 1876 and baptised 30th October 1876 in Exeter St James. He married Bertha Mear(s) in 1898, Exeter. He worked as a merchant's clerk in Exeter. He died in 1950.

Albert Frederick Chapman was born in 1879. He married either Alice Florence Southard or Annie Wiggins in 1904, Exeter. He died in 1952.

Alfred Edwin Chapman was born in 1880. He died at home in Summerland Street, Exeter and was buried on 4th December 1882, Exeter St James.

Florence Ethel Chapman was born in 1884. She married George Abbott in Exeter 1906. She died on 17th December 1964 at 18 North Street, Exeter.
