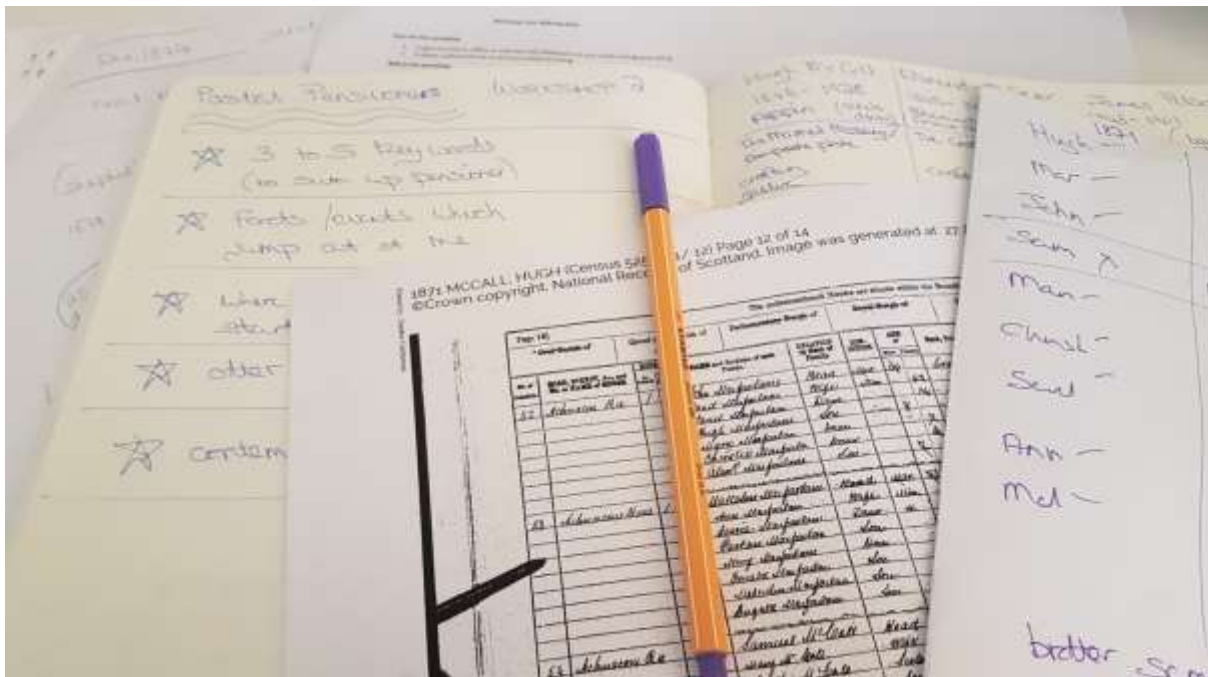


*AM POSTA PÒSTA (THE MARRIED POSTMAN): HUGH MCCOLL (1848-1928)
BY SANDRA CAIRNCROSS*

Hugh McColl was born into a Gaelic-speaking, crofting family in the West Highlands. His life provides insights into a changing way of life, as families moved away from crofting to seek work in new fields that offered better security and provision for old age. It was not just their way of life which changed; the language that people spoke in their homes, and with neighbours also changed, as English replaced Gaelic in daily life.

Hugh was the eldest child of Samuel McColl and Mary McFarlane. He had at least eight younger siblings. Mary was 22 when Hugh was born and 40 when she gave birth to her youngest. The 1871 census sees Hugh's parents living in a croft in Appin with eight of their children, aged between four and twenty-one.. Sarah, an elder sister of Samuel, is also living with the family. She is described as a pauper and having been an imbecile for thirty-two years. Sarah remained with Samuel and Mary until she died from bronchitis in 1882.

Living conditions must have been cramped - their house is described as having only two rooms with windows. One room would be a kitchen, where the family would sit and eat, with meals typically cooked over a peat fire. Vegetables and other crops would be grown, and the family may have had access to common pastureland for livestock.

Census records show that Hugh's father also worked as a shepherd, drystone builder, and an agricultural labourer, suggesting that the croft on its own could not sustain the family.

Hugh's mother Mary was in her early sixties when her husband – Hugh's father -- died in 1890. Mary then took over the croft. Three daughters are living with her in the 1891 census; two are dressmakers and the third a domestic servant.

Hugh had married Mary McNab in November 1876. He was twenty-seven and a rural messenger. Mary was thirty-one and a domestic servant.

Their first child, Samuel, was born in August 1878 in Fort William. Hugh's occupation is described as "letter carrier" on his son's birth certificate, but it is not until December 1878 that he officially joined the Post Office, when he was appointed as a messenger in Appin. This was perhaps prompted by the need to secure a more regular income than crofting on its own could provide. The Post Office with its pension provision would also have offered security for old age.

The family settled in Port Appin. Unlike his parents, Hugh and Mary moved regularly, although links with crofting remained as census records show:

- 1881 Rural Letter Carrier & Crofter 2 Port Appin Crofts
- 1891 Rural Postman Dalnashean
- 1901 Retired Postman Linnhe View Villa Druimnahurrich Cottage
- 1911 Post Office Pensioner & Crofter Port Appin Crofts

Hugh was living on a croft when he died at home of senile decay. His death was registered by his eldest son who was still living with his parents. The onset of senile decay would have meant that Hugh was less able to look after himself. Just as his parents had looked after his aunt, so too did Hugh's family care for him in his later years.

Many poorer families would have been unable to look after family members with this condition, and instead they would try to have them admitted to poorhouses/workhouses or lunatic asylums. They were often being seen as too physically weak for asylums but too challenging for poorhouses/workhouses ¹.

Hugh possibly had joined the postal service as a new father in order to provide a regular income and a better standard of living than crofting alone could offer. It seems fitting that when "Am posta pòsta" himself needed care, it was provided by his wife and eldest son.

Postscript: Gaelic and English

The census record from 1881 onwards show that Hugh, Mary and their children were all Gaelic speakers. A count of Gaelic speakers was first made in 1881 with a 'G' simply added to

the place of birth for those who spoke Gaelic. A new column was introduced from 1891 onwards to record if someone spoke Gaelic only, or Gaelic and English. It was left blank if the person was a non-Gaelic speaker.

The 1881 census records that all the family spoke Gaelic, including Hugh and Mary's second son who was only one year old. Everyone else on that page is also a Gaelic speaker. The same is largely true for the page including Hugh's parents; all are Gaelic and English speakers, except for the wife and sons of a farmer who had 105 acres, although the farmer himself spoke Gaelic. An early example, perhaps, of the start of the disappearance of Gaelic.

Hugh and Mary and their children are recorded in 1891 as being Gaelic speakers only. There are three other households on their census page, one is also Gaelic-only and the other two are recorded as speaking both Gaelic and English.

In 1901 and 1911 Hugh and Mary, and children still living with them, are shown as speaking Gaelic and English. I wonder if this means that people who had been brought up as native Gaelic speakers now also had to speak English more frequently. Everyone in the other households listed on the same page are also recorded as speakers of both Gaelic and English.

The situation has shifted further in 1911. There are 11 households listed on the census page for Hugh and Mary. There are no Gaelic-only speakers, and the majority of people still speak both. There is evidence of children no longer being brought up speaking Gaelic. In one family the eldest child of 14 is recorded as speaking Gaelic and English but her three younger siblings aged 12,10 and 4 do not speak Gaelic.

This is just a small insight into the shift away from Gaelic to English in Scotland, a decline which hastened over the course of the 20th century. There were 254,415 Gaelic speakers in 1891 in Scotland, including Hugh and his family. This had fallen to 58,652 in 2001.²

It is not known what happened to Hugh and Mary's children. If they married and had children, then it is likely that these children would have been brought up predominantly speaking English. This is the experience in my own family. One of my great-grandmothers was brought up in Argyll speaking Gaelic. She moved to Dundee and her children grew up speaking English.

Recent years have seen an increase in the language, with Gaelic-Medium Education being offered in nearly half of all Scottish Local Authorities and growing numbers of adult learners and so, perhaps like me, a descendant of Hugh and Mary is also learning the language that our ancestors spoke at home.

Samuel appears in 1861 census with his family. He is 4. He does not appear with family in 1871 census.

Mary McColl 1859-1892

Mary is with her parents in 1881. Her occupation is given as crofter's daughter.

Mary is with her mother and two sisters in 1891. Her occupation is given as dressmaker.

Mary died at Achnacone

Christina McColl 1860-

Christina is with her mother and two sisters in 1891. Her occupation is given as Tablemaid - Dom – Serv.

Christina was living at Achnacone Cottage when she died on 24th Sept 1942⁴. Her surname is spelt MacColl. Her headstone was erected by her sister Sarah.

Sarah McColl 1864

Sarah is with her mother and two sisters in 1891. Her occupation is given as dressmaker.

Sarah was still alive in 1942 when she erected a headstone in memory of her sister Christina.

Hugh McColl married Mary McNab on the 23rd November in 1876.

Hugh's occupation was given as rural messenger and Mary's as domestic servant. Mary was 31 (so born about 1845). Her parents were Donal McNab (Woolen Dyer deceased) and Catherine McNab ms McDonald

Mary died in 1931. Her name appears as MacNab on gravestone

Hugh and Mary are buried in Kinlochlaigh Old Churchyard in Argyll. Hugh's parents and some siblings are also buried here
